1.2 CALL OF PAPERS (Letter from the Editors): *The European Journal of Comparative Economics (EJCE)*.

The new e-journal, *The European Journal of Comparative Economics (EJCE)*, to be published by EACES (European Association for Comparative Economic Studies) and LIUC (Università Carlo Cattaneo – LIUC), is now being launched. The journal will start as a semiannual publication, provided free on the internet to the community of scholars.

Several years have elapsed since the beginning of transition in Eastern Europe, and the profession has learnt a lot about the importance of institutions in the economy and our deep need for additional research on their influence on the interaction of the units that play the economic game. The study of economies that do not fit the paradigm of the competitive market, a field of enquiry that used to belong to the sideline of scientific enquiry, has been joined by leading scientists in the field, who were inspired by the new knowledge gained through the processes of transition and intrigued by the policy problems posed by transformation of bureaucratically run socialist economies into capitalist market economies. We hope that our new e-journal will prove an efficient disseminator of new comparative economic knowledge and serve as a doorway for young researchers, in East and West, North and South, to this important and fascinating field.

We are writing to you to ask you contributing an article to one of the first issues of *The European Journal of Comparative Economics*. We do not wish to restrict the choice of your contribution, because we believe that the field is very wide, and covers both empirical and theoretical problems that concern institutions and their interrelations in the economy. These may concern any sector in the economy, from finance, manufacturing or commerce, and any country, from the South, East, or West. We hope that you will join us in this endeavor.

2.3. Association of American Geographers Annual Meeting "Integrating 'Old' and 'New' Europe: Globalization, Competitiveness, and Transition". 14-19 March, 2004, Philadelphia.

Organisation: RGS-IBG Postsocialist Geographies Research Group and the AAG Russian, Central Eurasian, and East European Specialty Group.

The enlargement of the EU in 2004 promises to complicate further Europe's already multifaceted geographical landscape. For the accession countries of central and eastern Europe, the forthcoming enlargement of the EU is indicative of their 'successful' movement away from the socialist regimes of pre-1989/1991. At the same time, other former socialist countries have been 'slow-tracked' and others still have limited short- to medium-term interest in EU membership for a variety of reasons.

The aim of this call is to bring together scholars interested in addressing the complexities and 'messiness' engendered by the EU accession process within central and eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union. Particular emphasis is placed on the following broad sub-themes:

- Territoriality and Governance
- Society and Culture
- Cities and Urban Environments

2.5. WDI/CEPR Annual International Conference on Transition Economics, Hanoi, Vietnam May 27-31, 2004.

Conference is organized by the William Davidson Institute (WDI) and the Centre for Economic Policy Research (CEPR), and is hosted this year by the National Center for Social Sciences and Humanities of Vietnam (NCSSH) and the United Nations Development Program (UNDP). The Scientific Organizing Committee consists of Erik Berglöf (SITE, Stockholm School of Economics, CEPR, and WDI), Do Hoai Nam (NCSSH), Gérard Roland (U.C. Berkeley, ECARES, CEPR and WDI), Jan Svejnar (WDI, University of Michigan, CERGE-EI, and CEPR), and Katherine Terrell (WDI, University of Michigan, and CEPR). The conference will take place in Hanoi, Vietnam, Thursday, May 27 – Sunday, May 30, 2004. It will provide a forum for leading economists and other social scientists working on

transition and on broader issues of development and institutional change to meet, present new research, develop collaborative relationships, and complete ongoing research. The conference will also invite the participation of key policy-makers and researchers in the region. Together with UNDP, WDI and CEPR will also sponsor a policy conference "Globalization, Integration and Transition" on May 25-26 involving senior policymakers from ten transition economies. It will be closely linked to the Annual International Conference on Transition Economics.

Funding is available for travel and accommodation expenses, but it is expected that participants with grants will use these to cover their own expenses, and thereby free up space for others. It is anticipated that demand will exceed the space available, so strong preference will be given to those who plan to stay for the entire duration of the conference. We would be grateful if you could inform your colleagues about this opportunity. We would like to attract a diverse group including women, young academics, and researchers from emerging and transition economy countries, particularly from the region.

There are no restrictions as to nationality (except that US citizens are excluded from eligibility). Fellows are required to attend the annual International Fellows in Philanthropy Conference prior to their fellowship year and are strongly encouraged to participate in subsequent annual conferences.

3.3. Advanced Training Courses In Science Policy

In addition to being able to provide a systematic introduction to the field of policy analysis, the Specialists are expert policy advisers and highly qualified analysts who will help Trainees to develop a deeper understanding of the nature of scientific and technological problems and

opportunities, specialised methods used to analyse scientific and technological issues and the dynamics of science and technology in relation to national and international institutions and organizations. An ATC can provide the foundation for further training in science communication or for a career in areas such as policy-related or commercial posts involving research funding and administration, regulatory or public interest responsibilities, environmental protection, technology transfer and government service on national and international levels. Science Policy practitioners from Partner countries who wish to participate as Trainees should contact one of the Co-Directors of the meeting, whose contact details are provided.

Special provisions have been agreed for scientists from NATO-member countries Czech Republic, Hungary and Poland, to allow them also to apply for participation and support as Trainees, to take advantage of the training possibilities of the ATCs. Program on New Approaches to Russian Security (PONARS) begun in February 1997. It is a small network of scholars who analyze Russian and Eurasian security issues and the region's role in international affairs. These scholars are leading social scientists; many teach at institutions of higher learning in the US, Russia, and Ukraine. PONARS policy memos are short, succinct (two to four page) memos primarily intended for a policymaking audience. They are derived from the current research of PONARS members and have become an excellent resource for policymakers and non-policymakers alike. The memos are thorough and accessible, and cover topics too current to be addressed by journal articles. Electronic full text versions are available since 1997.

RePEc (Research Papers in Economics)

RePEc is a distributed collaborative project with more than 380 contributing institutions world wide. Its aim is to improve the dissemination of research results using electronic means. The core of the project is a distributed data set which provides information about working papers, articles published in commercial journals and software of interest for Economists. Any department or research institution may join RePEc providing information about the documents they publish or distribute. In this sense, RePEc follows a decentralized contribution model where different institutions provide metadata on their publications to a common data set. Such metadata are freely distributed on the internet and can be used or aggregated by third part institutions in order to provide added value services to the end users. At the moment more than 380 institutions over the world provide data and there are 12 user services. User services are, for instance:
