1.2 CALL OF PAPERS (Letter from the Editors): *The European Journal of Comparative Economics* (EJCE).

The new e-journal, *The European Journal of Comparative Economics* (EJCE), to be published by EACES (European Association for Comparative Economic Studies) and LIUC (Università Carlo Cattaneo – LIUC), is now being launched. The journal will start as a semiannual publication, provided free on the internet to the community of scholars.

Several years have elapsed since the beginning of transition in Eastern Europe, and the profession has learnt a lot about the importance of institutions in the economy and our deep need for additional research on their influence on the interaction of the units that play the economic game. The study of economies that do not fit the paradigm of the competitive market, a field of enquiry that used to belong to the sideline of scientific enquiry, has been joined by leading scientists in the field, who were inspired by the new knowledge gained through the processes of transition and intrigued by the policy problems posed by transformation of bureaucratically run socialist economies into capitalist market economies. We hope that our new e-journal will prove an efficient disseminator of new comparative economic knowledge and serve as a doorway for young researchers, in East and West, North and South, to this important and fascinating field.

We are writing to you to ask you contributing an article to one of the first issues of *The European Journal of Comparative Economics*. We do not wish to restrict the choice of your contribution, because we believe that the field is very wide, and covers both empirical and theoretical problems that concern institutions and their interrelations in the economy. These may concern any sector in the economy, from finance, manufacturing or commerce, and any country, from the South, East, or West. We hope that you will join us in this endeavor.

BASEES welcomes participation from UK and non-UK scholars, whether members of academic staff or postgraduate students. We encourage the submission of complete panels (3 speakers, or 2 speakers plus discussant) but do not require it.

All abstracts in linguistics, language teaching and translation studies may be sent directly to the subject organiser, Dr Jan Fellerer

Any preliminary enquiries in linguistics, language teaching and translation studies about housing, travel, etc. before the abstract deadline of 1 October should be sent to Dr Neil Bermel (n.bermel@sheffield.ac.uk). Participants will be notified of the status of their submission by the end of November. Submissions and enquiries in the other fields represented at the conference should go to the respective subject organiser (see the website for more information). BASEES does not undertake to fund all scholars whose papers are accepted; participants must count on paying their own travel and conference expenses. Some funding is available for postgraduate students at UK universities.

2.2 WDI/CEPR Annual International Conference on Transition Economics, Hanoi, Vietnam May 27-31, 2004.

Conference is organized by the William Davidson Institute (WDI) and the Centre for Economic Policy Research (CEPR), and is hosted this year by the National Center for Social Sciences and Humanities of Vietnam (NCSSH) and the United Nations

Development Program (UNDP). The Scientific Organizing Committee consists of Erik Bergl f (SITE, Stockholm School of Economics, CEPR, and WDI), Do Hoai Nam (NCSSH), G rard Roland (U.C. Berkeley, ECARES, CEPR and WDI), Jan Svejnar (WDI, University of Michigan, CERGE-EI, and CEPR), and Katherine Terrell (WDI, University of Michigan, and CEPR). The conference will take place in Hanoi, Vietnam, Thursday, May 27 – Sunday, May 30, 2004. It will provide a forum for leading economists and other social scientists working on transition and on broader issues of development and institutional change to meet, present new research, develop collaborative relationships, and complete ongoing research. The conference will also invite the participation of key policy-makers and researchers in the region. Together with UNDP, WDI and CEPR will also sponsor a policy conference “Globalization, Integration and Transition” on May 25-26 involving senior policymakers from ten transition economies. It will be closely linked to the Annual International Conference on Transition Economics.

Funding is available for travel and accommodation expenses, but it is expected that participants with grants will use these to cover their own expenses, and thereby free up space for others. It is anticipated that demand will exceed the space available, so strong preference will be given to those who plan to stay for the entire duration of the conference. We would be grateful if you could inform your colleagues about this opportunity. We would like to attract a diverse group including women, young academics, and researchers from emerging and transition economy countries, particularly from the region.

2.5 Economic Growth and Distribution : On the Nature and Causes of the Wealth of Nations. Pisa (Italy), June 16 - 18, 2004

Objective: The interaction between economic growth and distribution was the hallmark of classical economic theorizing. After the Second World War this theme experienced a revival, especially within the post-Keynesian and Classical/Maxian schools. With the development of the "new growth theory", starting in the mid 1980s – distribution and growth has become the subject of intensive research.

In the recent literature growth and distribution is a lens through which we can investigate the complex interplay of the factors explaining the nature and causes of the wealth of nations: population growth; structural change: technological progress; and physical, social, and human capital accumulation.

The goal of this Conference is to provide a forum for the presentation and discussion of different approaches to the issues of growth and distribution, and their theoretical, empirical, historical and methodological implications.

Conference topics will include, but are not limited to: Theoretical issues, Empirical analysis, History of economic analysis, Economic methodology.

It is planned to publish selections of papers in special issues of the European Journal of the History of Economic Thought, the Journal of Economic Growth,

and in *Metroeconomica* and a larger selection in a volume with a major publisher. Papers that will be published in a special issue of a journal will meet the standards of that journal. All papers will be made available on the Internet until the end of the Conference.

Deadline: Submission of a 1-2 page abstract (if possible, jointly with the whole paper) should be sent by email to submissions@ec.unipi.it, in pdf or in word format, before March 30, 2004. Authors will receive notification of acceptance by April 30, 2004. The whole papers are to be sent by e-mail within May 30, 2004.

Attendance and Fees : The Conference fees of 200 Euro will cover all meals (two dinners, two lunches, four coffee-breaks) and printed material. They might also cover accommodation for a number of nights for Ph.D. students and scholars coming from selected countries. All participants will be required to provide for their own expenses; details on accommodation opportunities will be provided.

2.6 International Conference "Institutions And Policies For The New Europe". Portorož-Koper, Slovenia, June 17-18, 2004.

Organisation: IMAD (Institute of Macroeconomic Analysis and Development – Ljubljana), ROSES (Research Centre on Transition Economies – Paris) and Faculty of Management, University of Primorska (Koper)

The general aim of the conference is to discuss institutional innovations and policy reforms that would be necessary for a viable and successful enlarged Europe. The intention is to create a broad and lively conference, combining different viewpoints and experiences. The Conference strongly welcome participants from both academic research institutions and policy oriented think-tanks or private consultants, as well as practitioners of policies and institutional reforms. The conference builds on the good tradition of annual events previously organised separately by two institutions (Conference on Enlargement by Roses, and Institutions in Transition by Imad). For 2004, the programme committee has chosen the three main topics listed below; papers not corresponding to any of them will be accepted only in case of exceptional quality, innovativeness, or relevance for the general programme framework.

Specific conference topics:

- Reforms of the EU cohesion and regional development policies
- Stability and Growth Pact reforms, and financing of growth
- Future EU Enlargements

Instructions for submission: The selection of papers will be made on the basis of draft papers by the scientific committee of the conference. The scientific committee will also recommended the most outstanding

papers for possible publication in a journal or in a special conference publication.

Deadline for submission of draft papers is March 29. The authors will be informed about selection of papers by May 7, and they will be asked to confirm their participation within five days time. The authors will have to submit final papers by May 31. Final papers will be posted on the conference web page, in order to be available to other participants, and distributed directly to formal discussants. In case the authors fail to submit final papers by the deadline, draft papers will be posted in the web page instead and sent to formal discussants. Hard copies of papers will not be distributed to participants by the organizers, but the authors may bring copies for distribution on their own. A compact disk containing all papers, possibly some presentations and discussants, and other conference material, will be sent to all participants shortly after the conference. Each author should submit two files:

- one containing the whole paper (including tables and graphs), in a PDF or Word for Windows format
- the other containing a short (max. 1 page) abstract of the paper and basic information about the authors; this file should be sent in Word for Windows format.

2.19 VII ICCEES World Congress "Europe – Our common Home?" Berlin July 25th – 30th 2005

Organisation International Council for Central and East European Studies.

The Congress will take place at the *Humboldt Universität*, in the centre of the city. The opening and closing ceremonies will be held at the *Haus der Kulturen der Welt/Kongresshalle* (House of World Cultures/ Congress Hall) located in a beautiful park, the *Tiergarten*. The *Haus der Kulturen der Welt/Kongresshalle* can easily be reached by public transport. The local organiser is the *Deutsche Gesellschaft für Osteuropakunde* (German Association for Eastern European Studies).

The International Programme Committee (IPC) for the VII World Congress invites all interested persons to submit proposals for panels, papers and roundtables which show results of new research in all fields and disciplines in the study of Central and Eastern Europe and the former Soviet Union.

The theme of the congress is "Europe – Our common Home?". Some 15 years after the change of regime in the countries of Central and East Europe, the IPC wants to offer an opportunity to examine the state of the continent concerning all aspects of European integration processes. It takes into regard that some countries from the former Eastern Block will already have joined the European Union. How far has the idea of a common home Europe already been realised? Which are the new common features and values within Europe, and where are new divides?

These notes for conference participants are meant to give some indications for their presentations at the congress. They do not exclude any theme or field of research which fits into the main theme of the congress. Everyone should feel invited to contribute with a presentation of his or her research results to the work of the congress which will offer a forum for a broad range of themes and of disciplines.

Fields of research: Baltic States, Caucasian States, Central Asia, Cultural Studies, Economy, European Integration Processes, Gender Issues, Geography, History, Jewish Studies, Language/Linguistics, Law, Literature, Pedagogical Sciences, Politics, International Relations, Security, Religion and Philosophy, Sociology, South-East Europe.

Conditions for proposals?

1. All proposals have to be of an academic character.
2. All proposals have to be approved by the IPC. Only approved papers will be part of the official congress programme.
3. Proposals for panels include usually a chair, up to three speakers and a discussant.
4. Panels must have an international composition. There will be no panels with participants from one country only.
5. The panels last for 90 minutes. It is highly recommended that no speaker will have more than 15 minutes for his or her presentation.
6. Whoever proposes a panel is expected to obtain the prior approval of all panelists he or she wishes to propose. No one may be proposed without his/her knowledge and consent.
7. No person may propose more than one panel. No person may participate in more than two panels.
8. Individual papers may be included in the congress programme by decision of the IPC. They may be presented in special sessions, attached to existing panels or accepted as posters.
9. The IPC has the right to attach individual papers to panels. The chair will be asked to allow the speakers of such attached papers 5 minutes to present their paper from the floor.
10. There will be an opportunity to display and present posters in a designated area at the conference venue. Proponents of individual papers may indicate that they are interested in presenting a poster.
11. The official congress languages are English, Russian, German and French. All parts of the programme must be in one of these languages. The

congress organisation will not provide translation (except for the opening and closing ceremonies where simultaneous translation between English, Russian and German will be available).

12. The congress administration language is English. All correspondence, proposals etc. have to be in English. During the congress, there will be stewards around with knowledge of the congress languages.

Procedure for proposing papers.

1. Proposals may be sent in in electronic form only. Proposals have to be submitted in English, regardless of the language of the panels during the congress. The address is <http://www.iccees2005.de>. Inquiries concerning registration formalities should be made to info@iccees2005.de.

2. The deadline for proposals is February 29th, 2004. However, proponents are asked to send in their proposals as early as possible.

3. The IPC will meet in spring 2004, decide about all proposals and compose the final programme.

4. By summer 2004, all proponents whose papers were accepted, will be informed about the decision of the IPC. They will get official letters of invitation which may serve for getting funds and obtaining visa.

5. For all accepted papers, an abstract in English has to be sent in by February 28th, 2005. The abstract shall not exceed one page. All abstracts will be published in an abstract-book which all participants will receive when they register. No paper without abstract can be part of the official programme.

6. Abstracts will be printed in the form in which they are sent in. There will be no correction or change. Proponents will have to take care that their abstracts are in correct English.

7. Each abstract must indicate the language in which the paper will be presented.

8. Each abstract has to contain an email-address so that the proponent may be easily contacted.

9. All accepted papers are eligible for publication in the congress proceedings. The decision whether a paper can be published will be made by the editor of the congress proceedings.

Please notice that all participants are expected to register officially and to pay the registration fee. Additionally, they have to cover all their own costs for travel, accommodation and meals. For registration fees, see the attached list.

The organisation will try to obtain a certain number of travel grants for participants from Central and East European countries.
